Welcome to the November/December Hyndland News. Our school community have had a very busy, enjoyable and productive term so far.

Our Junior school, S1, S2 and S3 have had a variety of activities, ranging from S1 Settling in interviews, Fire Service input, Science Masterclasses in liaison with Glasgow University, a S2 Chess League victory, an IDL trip to the Grosvenor, a live screening of Julius Caesar and the launch of the Foodbank Appeal to name a few.

Our Senior school have been engaging in feedback with staff and identifying the next stages of their learning journey. They continue to represent the school in a positive way.

Continuing the theme of pupil participation, our school captains, alongside the junior council, have been very active in working with our local councillor in communicating their desire for a cleaner community.

We, also this term, hosted a very special guest, Sir Tom Hunter, who chaired a focus group of S3, S4, S5 and S6 pupils to help the Hunter Foundation understand the issues pertinent to young people. This was a very fruitful and interesting discussion and we really enjoyed having his presence.

We were very proud of our Advanced Higher History class who presented a thought-provoking reflection at Remembrance Assemblies for every year group. These were very well received and allowed us, a school community, to take some time out of our busy schedules to reflect on others.

We have been very active in our Children in Need activities and managed to raise both monies and awareness of this cause. Our own fundraising continues to be making excellent progress, with the Mark Beaumont night sold out and Eilidh Doyle night progressing well too.

We recognise how hard our young musicians have been working on their concert material supported by the Music team, and are looking forward to the 12th and 13th December in Hyndland Parish Church and the 16th December in Glasgow Cathedral. It would be great to see as many of our school community there as is possible. I hope you all have an enjoyable, relaxing festive period when it comes.

SCIENCE FACULTY

With the city's Christmas lights being turned on, and the holidays only a few weeks away attention for our senior phase pupils is beginning to focus on the prelim examinations in January! We asked two of our senior science students to share their thoughts ahead of the exams.

The thoughts of a 4th Year Science Student:

"So far in 4th year I have enjoyed the pressure of exams because it makes me feel like I have something to work towards. Although I am nervous about my prelims (my first set of 'proper' exams) I am also looking forward to see how I cope in exam conditions and to get a better idea of how I might do in the final exams in May, which I am even more nervous about! For me, the most difficult part of this year is beginning to study because it can be hard to get my head down and revise in my own time without being distracted by friends and other things around me. "

The thoughts of a 6th year Science student:

"I used to think that prelim's didn't matter and that I could start studying properly after them. However that was not the case. I realise I had left it too late to study for all the content in all my subjects in previous years. I wish I had studied more before the prelims even by doing a few past paper questions every night in the run up to the exams. Instead I left it to the night before to flick through the 'How to Pass' books and hoped that I could memorise it quickly. It didn't work. Just reading and not practicing questions doesn't help. My advice to everyone sitting exams in January would be to study just a little bit every night, it doesn't need to be a lot but just by doing a little can make a big difference. If you were able to believe in Santa for 8 years, then you can believe in yourself in the run up to your exams. "

There are regular supported study sessions being offered to all senior phase students across the Science faculty to help support revision outside of class. Pupils also have access to a wide range of revision materials through our 'Science @ Hyndland' website (just google it!), SMHW, BBC Bitesize, as well as other resources such as Twig on Glow. Higher pupils will also find excellent revision materials through Scholar which can also be accessed through Glow.

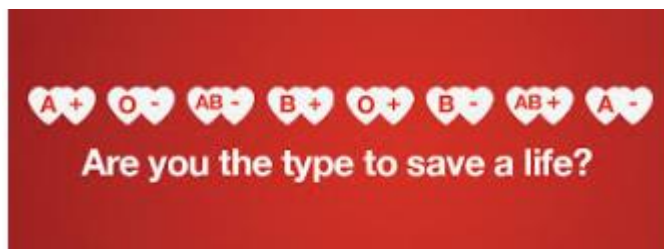

Primary Transition News

Primary 7 Information Evening

On Thursday 5th October our first information event was held for parents and carers of primary 7 children. The purpose of the evening was to share key information about the transition progress. Mrs Forrester, Depute Head Teacher for primary/secondary transition provided an overview of the transition programme and work undertaken to support students as they prepare to join Hyndland Secondary School. Mrs Mills from the Pastoral Care team attended to discuss the important role that Pastoral Care play in the transition process and to also provide an overview of how they work with both parents and children in the school. Mrs McFarlane then provided some information about how students with additional support needs are supported at the school. Attendance was fantastic and we would like to thank all parents, carers and children who came along to the evening. The next transition event for parents is on Thursday 15th March 2018 starting at 6pm in the Airlie Theatre. On this evening a number of classrooms will be open and parents/carers and primary 7 children will have the opportunity to experience life as a student at Hyndland Secondary School. We look forward to welcoming parents, carers and primary 7 children to this evening.



Meeting for P7 parents – Whiteinch Community Library

On Thursday 12th October a meeting was held in Whiteinch Library for parents and carers of primary 7 children. Glasgow Life staff attended this event to tell parents about the facilities that the library can offer to them and their children. Members of staff from Hyndland Secondary also attended to chat about the transition process from Primary to Secondary school and how parents can best support their child with homework tasks at home. P7 visits to Hyndland Secondary School – English Department

During the month of October, primary 7 students from Whiteinch, Thornwood, Hyndland and Broomhill Primary Schools have been visiting the English Department to undertake a programme of work to help assist with the transition from primary to secondary school. During the three visits the students have been working hard to develop their reading and understanding skills by looking at a close reading passage on the Daily Mile. They are now undertaking an informative writing piece on this work. The English Department have been very impressed with the enthusiasm and engagement displayed by all of the primary 7 children and we look forward to welcoming them back to Hyndland during the year ahead.

P7 visits to Hyndland Secondary School – Maths Department

This term members of the Maths Department have been working with primary 7 children in each of the primary schools. The purpose of this work is to help develop numeracy skills which are crucial to success in Maths in S1 and beyond. Again – the Maths staff have been very positive about the work ethic and enthusiasm displayed to date.

Primary 6 / 7 Homework Club – Whiteinch Community Library

Ms Rennie (Acting Principal Teacher of Enhanced Transitions) has been working with staff at Whiteinch Library to organise a weekly homework club for students in primary 6 and 7 to attend. GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT

The Higher Geographers have been busy carrying out fieldwork over the last couple of weeks. In October they visited their case study area of Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park. The pupils worked with the rangers to investigate the various land users in the park and the potential conflicts between them. The rangers explained their role in diffusing conflicts and their day to day tasks. Pupils also carried out fieldwork techniques such as a field sketching and recognising glacial features. This was an excellent opportunity for the pupils to see their textbook case study in real life and to see evidence of glacial erosion first hand.



In November the Geographers were in Clachan of Campsie to gather data for their Higher assignment. They were investigating the changes in river variables as the river travelled from source to mouth. It was a hard day's graft but they worked hard and produced some excellent results. Well done!

FURTHER EDUCATION FAIR AND COLLEGE WORKSHOPS

All S4, 5 and 6 students who are considering college, employment or training from summer 2018 will be invited to go to the Skills Scotland Education Fair on the afternoon of 29 November. They will be given an opportunity to talk directly to college admissions staff, and given information about apprenticeships and employment.

The same students will also be encouraged to attend College Application Workshops at the end of November in the Library. Skills Development Scotland staff, and Pastoral Care teachers, will help young people apply for college courses and training.

STRASBOURG TRIP

"Last week, three of us in Mr Kearney's Advanced Higher French pupils (Shona Russell, Katie MacDonald and Sophie Parke) travelled to Strasbourg, France. We were participating in the Euroscola program, with 23 other sixth year pupils from all across Glasgow who were studying an Advanced language (French, Spanish or German). To allow us to try out our languages, we interacted with Strasbourg locals as we held street surveys and made short films about the city. We even made it along to a local high school to sit in on their classes, have lunch and teach them Ceilidh dancing. We were given a tour of the European Parliament and met with Scottish MEP's to ask them questions and discuss issues that were important to us. We returned to the European Parliament on the Friday to take part in the official Euroscola Day, with pupils from all across Europe – from Estonia to Sweden. Sitting in the hemicycle, we were given the opportunity to pose questions to the Vice President of the EU – for example Katie's brilliant question concerning an independent Scotland. We then separated into groups of ranging nationalities to discuss our opinions and propositions on issues such as Human Rights, Humanitarian Aid and the Environment. Representatives were elected to present each group's propositions (one of whom was the amazing Shona), and we collectively voted on whether to pass the proposed motions or not. The week the three of us spent in Strasbourg was unbelievable and we gained so much – from confidence and a greater degree of fluency in our language, to the new friends we made from all across Glasgow. His asking of us to sit down with him and chat made it clear that the views of young people in education are definitely valuable to him and the opportunity to bring them to light is something that I for one am definitely thankful for.
