We Will Rock You is a jukebox musical, featuring the music of Queen, which opened in London in 2002 to widely mixed reviews to say the least. Despite its rocky start, the show ran in the West End for 12 years, as well as being performed all over the globe and, in 2011, winning an Olivier Audience Award for Most Popular Show. It is set in the future, in a world where live music has been banned by dictator Killer Queen, when outsider Galileo joins forces with the revolutionary Bohemians to bring back real music in the form of Queen's greatest hits. But should that stop us, helping these people?


In every culture there are people who would blow up a building or hurt innocent people with relish, there seems to be a shooting every week in America but do we condemn their whole culture?

OBAMA AND PUTIN: JOINING FORCES?

It was only recently that the Russian president, Vladamir Putin, and US president, Barack Obama, debated the issue of intervention in Syria.

When addressing the UN general assembly Putin asserted that it would an extremely consequential mistake not to ally with the Syrian army in the ongoing battle with the Islamic state and argued that it was evident that the Syrian military were the only force that was truly fighting the ISIS militants within the country saying:

"We think it is an enormous mistake not to cooperate with the Syrian government and its armed forces, who are valiantly fighting terrorism face to face...We should finally acknowledge that no one but President Assad's armed forces and militia are truly fighting the Islamic state and other terrorist organisations in Syria."

Putin then proceeded to criticise countries of the west for only arming "moderate" rebels in Syria. Putin's speech was delivered only a few hours before an intense meeting with Obama in which the idea of joining forces (of Russia and America) to defeat Isis and the issue in Syria were presented to the US president.

Following the meeting, at Obama's UN general assembly speech he announced that the US was prepared to work alongside Russia, as well as Iran, in order to achieve a "managed transition" which would see the removal of Assad from power. He also commented:

"Syria cannot return to the pre-war status quo."

During his speech Obama discussed the tensions between the US and Russia who had previously been Assad's most powerful ally. Despite many viewing Russia and America leaving their issues aside in order to prevent further catastrophe, thousands of Americans have long viewed Putin as some kind of devil and are disgusted by the US's decision to ally with them. It can be argued that it may be sinful to make a deal with the devil...but ultimately, wouldn't it be better than allowing this horrific chaos to continue? Especially since with the many countries involved there's a now a higher chance of being resolved. Especially since Syria just lost its strongest ally.
