Religious Observance policy

Hyndland Secondary School recognises the importance of young people participating and reflecting during periods of religious observance. The young people within Hyndland Secondary School represent a broad spectrum of religious and non-religious beliefs and we offer a programme which both recognises and respects every individual and their belief systems.

Each year during Christmas the young people and staff of Hyndland Secondary School have the opportunity to attend a service within Hyndland parish church led by the school Chaplin. Parents and carers of young people from religious beliefs other than Christianity may request that their young person be withdrawn from this service. Only a written request addressed to the year head will be considered. In such a case the young person will be given the opportunity to reflect or continue with their learning under supervision with the school.

Throughout the school session all young people will participate in religious observance during year group religious observance themed assemblies which will be led by the year head but will heavily involve the work of the young people from a particular year group. The young people will deliver the assembly which will focus on a particular religious observance theme to the rest of the year groups throughout the week.

Hyndland Secondary School provides six opportunities for religious observance per school session as well as the Christmas service. Each year group (S1-S6) have equal time devoted to religious observance and each year group will have the same consistency of delivery with the same theme presented to each year group during assemblies.

The following religious observance themes will be recognised during session 2014/2015:

- 1. Our Community. Led by Mr B. Mochan and S4 students.
- 2. <u>Remembrance</u> Led by Mrs L. Forrester and S6 Students.
- 3. <u>Holocaust</u> Led by Mrs L. Forrester and S6 students.
- 4. Diversity Led by Mrs L. Edgerton and S1 students.
- 5. Spring reflections Led by Mrs L Edgertson and S1 students
- 6. <u>Equality</u> Led by Mrs L Edgertson and S2 students

The theme approach allows all young people from the wide range of religious and non-religious beliefs that Hyndland Secondary School represents the opportunity to reflect and also develop thinking skills, positive mental attitudes, compassion for others and an understanding of the community in which they live.

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Rationale Title	Members of the armed forces have lost their lives or have been left badly injured in wars spanning over one hundred year. It is important that in a civilised, democratic country we take time to reflect and acknowledge the sacrifices that others have made. Remembrance
stage	Led by S6
Aim	Young people will reflect on lives lost and value the importance of the sacrifices others have made and remember those who are no longer with us.
Objectives	At the end of the assembly the young people will: Have an awareness of conflict and war. Have an understanding of sacrifice and the sacrifices of others (including family and friends). Remember those who are no longer with us.

Introduction	Young people to discuss war, loss and sacrifice.
Stimulus	Selection of pictures and clips of those touched by loss including those involved in conflict.
Guided reflection	Young people to take time to remember those who have lost their lives both in conflict and those close to them.
Response and possible next steps	Discussions in RMPS, Personal Support Time and involvement in Remembrance events.
Evaluation	Young people are able to discuss the theme of Remembrance and take time to think of others.

Rationale	During world War 2 many millions of Jews were massacred by Adolf Hitler and his Nazi Generals. These crimes against humanity were so barbaric that it is important that the young people of Hyndland Secondary School are made aware of it and the politics of hate that lay behind these acts. As a school community it is important that we never discriminate against others.
Title	Holocaust
stage	Led by S6
Aim	Young people understand the Holocaust in relation to World War 2 and its relevance today.
Objectives	 At the end of the assembly the young people will: Understand the Holocaust in relation to World War 2. Understand the reasons behind the Holocaust. Learn the importance of equality and fairness.

Introduction	Young people to discuss the Holocaust, in terms of numbers and case studies. Set the scene.
Stimulus	Short film from a Holocaust survivor.
Guided reflection	Young people to think of division and disharmony in their life/community and look for solutions.
Response and possible next steps	Young people asked to take positive steps to make Hyndland Secondary School and the communities they live in free from hatred and discrimination. Further discussions with RMPS and Personal Support Time.
Evaluation	Positive steps taken by the young people to engage in discussions and action around awareness raising.

Rationale Title	Hyndland Secondary School serves a diverse group of young people who encompass a rage of different cultures, religions and lifestyles from across the socioeconomic spectrum. As a school, Hyndland Secondary School is proud of its young people and wants to showcase this and celebrate this diversity. Diversity
stage	Led by S1 students
Aim	Young people will understand and appreciate the diverse society in which they are part of and do so in an open minded and nurturing way.
Objectives	 At the end of the assembly the young people will: Understand the term 'diversity'. Understand and appreciate that other young people both within and outwith Hyndland Secondary School celebrate different cultures, beliefs and lifestyles that may be different from their own. Foster an open minded and tolerant approach to how they view the ever changing world in which they live.

Introduction	Young people to discuss the notion of diversity and show pictures and young people from Hyndland Secondary School who are from various religions, ethnic backgrounds and countries of birth.
Stimulus	Video clip from the Modern Languages department which showcases the wide range of languages spoken from young people who attend the school.
Guided reflection	Young people to take time to think about their approach to others and how they behave towards other from varying backgrounds and cultures.
Response and possible next steps	Young people to discuss Diversity during RMPS and Personal Support Time.
Evaluation	Young people to be asked about the impact of the assembly in focus groups.

Title	The young people of Hyndland Secondary School are supported by their parents/carers, teachers and those within the wider community including family (some of whom may no longer be with us). Aim	The young people will take time to understand and appreciate the support other give to them both in and out of school.
Objectives	 At the end of the assembly the young people will: Take time to think of those who have helped them during their lives. Have time to reflect on those who are no longer with us. Begin to take positive steps moving forward in both affecting their own lives and the lives of others.

Evaluation	Evaluative exercise during RMPS.

Response and possible next steps	Young people to be an active part of Hyndland Secondary and make their own individual and collective contributions in making it a truly open and welcoming establishment where everyone can succeed.
Evaluation	Equality/HWB questionnaire to be completed during Personal Support Time.
