



The Options Process Timeline

- It is vital that you take time to read over this carefully.




S4 TRACKING REPORT – ISSUED ON MONDAY 18 MARCH

- Look at the working grades carefully for each subject.
- Use this report to identify your '5 Best Subjects' these are the subjects which you will be directed to study in S5.

• It is vital that you play to your strengths in S5 so use the information on that tracking report to help guide you with this process.


INFORMATION EVENT – HELD ON THURSDAY 8 MARCH

- The link will be sent to families and posted on the year group team.




WEEK OF MONDAY 15TH APRIL

- During this last week of teaching prior to the SQA exams, you will be issued with your final S4 Tracking Report.
- This report is the SQA Estimate Report.
- It is vital that you use this report to direct you to your five strongest subjects.
- There should not be huge differences between this and your most recent report.




WEDNESDAY 17TH APRIL – 5PM

- This is the deadline for the final S4 into S5 Options Form.
- This will be submitted via a glow form.
- This is NOT a draft as we will base our school timetable and classes on the numbers collected from this.
- The form will be emailed to families and posted on the year group team.




Key Advice about the Options Process




1. Always Choose your 5 Best Subjects from S4

- Look at your most recent tracking report what subjects are your strongest? Where are you achieving the highest grades?
- Every year we see students thriving when they have selected from their strongest National 5 qualifications.
- For the MAJORITY of students in S4, our expectation is that you choose the five strongest subjects from S4.




2. Do I have to study English in S5?

- Every learner should aim to secure a minimum of National 5 in English by the end of S5 so if you did N4 English in S5 you must study National 5 in S5.
- Most learners will go onto study H English (if they achieve a minimum of a C at N5) in S5 as this tends to be an entry requirement for a lot of places of employment following graduation. Some university and college courses will request this.
- However some students may wish to do this in S6 if not one of their 'five best'.



3. Do I have to study Maths in S5?

- Every learner should aim to secure a minimum of National 5 Maths or Application of Maths by the END OF S6.
- If you are studying National 4 Maths in S4 you should consider studying National 5 in S5 (UNLESS YOU ARE AIMING TO SECURE 5 HIGHERS IN OTHER SUBJECTS).
- If you are currently N4 Maths, N5 Application of Maths is the best route for you to study in S5.




4. Should I study H Maths in S5?

- Our school data shows that students who achieve a minimum of a grade B at National 5 perform well at Higher.
- For those who achieve a C we would suggest **NOT** sitting Higher Maths in S5 , **UNLESS** you specially require this for your chosen University / College course.
- If you are planning to study a course in University that needs H Maths do this in S5 as success is more likely.
- A large number of courses do not insist on Higher Maths so do your research with Uni websites!




5. How many Higher subjects should I sit?

- Your aim is to sit as many Highers in S5 as possible (Universities refer to this as 'one sitting' or 'first sitting').
- This is why it is so important that you play to your strengths in S5 and choose your FIVE BEST from S4.
- You can then sit additional Highers in S6 either weaker subjects from S5 or brand new crash Higher subjects.



- However, remember you have two years to secure qualifications
 S5 and S6.
- For some learners it may be more effective to secure 1, 2, 3 or 4 Highers in S5 and then do more in S6.
- Take advice from your Pastoral Care Teacher on this and also use your grades to guide you.
- Grade A or B at N5 definitely Higher.
- Grade C potentially Higher (not Maths) take advice from your teacher.



6. Can I 'crash' any subjects in S5?


- The quickest answer is NO but a few exceptions.
- You are not able to select any crash Higher subjects in S5.
- If you studied N4 Sciences in S4, you can select N5 Lab Skills.
- If you studied N4 Social Subjects in S4, you can select N5 Travel and Tourism.
- If you are mostly studying N5 levels, you may chose Practical Cookery in S5.



7. Can I study a Part Time College Course in S5?

- We would suggest that the majority of S5 do **NOT** study the part-time college courses and leave this to S6.
- For some students a N5 college course may be a good option

 but this MUST be discussed with your Pastoral Care
 Teacher or House DHT in the first instance.
- Information is posted in the year group team including the Prospectus detailing what courses are on offer and how you apply!



7. Can I study a Part Time College Course in S5?

- If you want advice on whether you should study a part time college course you must speak to either your Pastoral Care Teacher or Miss Cusick in the first instance ASAP!
- For some it is a great idea but you MUST be fully committed to travelling and completing the full course during the year!




8. What happens if my SQA results are different to what I am expecting?

- We will be able to do LIMITED changes in August to course planning for S5 and S6 BUT this will only be based upon your SQA results.
- This is why it is so important that you make the right choices now! We will be deciding what classes to run based on these choices and this cannot change in August!




In summary our expectations of S5 are:

- Full timetable for every S5 student 5 subjects.
- Excellent attendance and timekeeping.
- Work ethic and positive attitude towards studies.
- Realisation of the jump in demand from National 5 to Higher courses.
- Homework deadlines will be met.
- Importance of acting as a role model at all times.






Making an appointment to see your Careers Advisor at Hyndland Secondary School - 2023-24










Respect Me – effectively challenging racism in schools:


"Unacceptable language and jokes around the school can create a climate of racism which both directly and indirectly excludes, threatens, hurts or humiliates young people".






As a school we must all ensure:


- We are challenging any kind of culture of casual racism use of inappropriate words even between friend.




SQA Exams Countdown and Support Available
